SHOULD EVERYONE DESERVE A SECOND CHANCE?

Shalom to all

This week's Torah portion Exodus 30:11-34:35) – is Ki Tisa, which means in English "when you carry". The phrase reads: "When you carry the heads of the Israelites..." What God means when he says that to Moses, is when you ask the people to raise up their heads to be counted don't count their heads, ask each one of them to give exactly half a Shekel, and at the end count the Shekels, and you'll know how many people you have in your nation. The sum which each person will give is exactly half a Shekel, whether the person is poor or rich and the money will go for the maintenance of the Tabernacle. It also says that the money would also be as follows: "The rich shall give no more, and the poor shall give no less than half a shekel, with which to give offering to the Lord, to atone for your souls." (15). In other words all people are

equal in the eyes of God and they can atone for their souls and everyone who gives half a Shekel "will get a second chance."

And indeed, in the subsequent events, it seemed that God had given second chances to some of the people who had "sinned". Notably is Moses who got a second chance after smashing the first set of Tablets when he saw that the Israelites were worshiping the Golden Calf. What was Moses' sin, you may ask? The Tablets were not his, they were meant to be given to the Children of Israel. Moses decided to smash them on his own accord. He could have easily turned around, climbed up the mountain and returned them back to God. Yet God didn't mention it and carved a second set of the Tablets.

The children of Israel who worshipped the Golden Calf also received a second chance from God by finally getting the Torah.

Aaron, Moses' brother got a second chance. He was the one responsible for fashioning the

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Golden Calf, and he admitted it. Yet, he also got a second chance from God, and resumed his priesthood.

Yet, some three thousand men who apparently had raised concerns about Moses' tardiness returning with the Torah, which initiated the reason for Aaron to fashion the Golden Calf, ended up mercilessly murdered by a group of Levites under Moses' directions. There were no investigations, or trials. They did not get a second chance – from neither God nor from Moses. Why not? They had supposedly paid their half shekels.

Shouldn't those three thousand men have deserved a second chance too?

Well, they really should have, but they did not get it, because the writers of the Torah wanted to teach future generations of Jews a lesson, a lesson about consequences or "paying a price". Whenever God threatens the Israelites with annihilation from the face of the earth, for any type of sin, it should be seen as a metaphor. Or otherwise, why should anyone follow a religion where God kills or sends his followers to their death? Just like in the Story of Korach and his tribe who perished when the earth opened up and swallowed them all. It was symbolic of expelling them from the community. Expelling people from a community in ancient times was a death sentence, because it was almost impossible for an individual, or even a group to survive on its own in a desert, or for that matter almost anywhere.

The Torah comes to tell us that in order to survive as a community, people need laws in order to hold them together as a homogenous group, while living without laws might bring any group, gradually into extinction.

Just think about it.

Corinne Bernstein – who passed away on February 17th – was an institution at Temple Beth El. She always sat in the same chair at the corner of the front section on the left-hand side of the aisle. She was usually the person who opened and closed the doors to the Ark. And she always kissed the cover of the Torah scroll in the process. Corinne had claimed the right to sit in that particular chair. From that chair she often turned to see who was sitting in the back half of the audience. There came a time when the Board of Directors decided to honor Corinne for her steadfast service to the temple by fixing her name to that chair. During that honoring ceremony there were many of her banker friends and other officials who had come to see her receive this honor. She took the placque with her when she moved to Santa Barbara.

The annual Hanukkah party was the temple's main fundraiser. We would have a raffle and it was very important to sell tickets for that raffle and among the prizes was a large amount of scrip. But there were also prizes contributed by local merchants. Corinne didn't drive so temple volunteers would drive her all around the city of Santa Maria where she approached doctors and small businessmen to purchase raffle tickets as well as contributed merchandize for prizes. When the High Holidays rolled around Corinne took on the responsibility of lining up congregants to bring various foods to the Break-the-Fast. She would spend the day in the kitchen supervising the hired help in setting up the vast display of wonderful foods and desserts on a long table in the patio. Those were unforgettable events and the people always looked forward to them. Corinne was very opinionated but no one could deny that she was very loyal and dedicated to the welfare of Temple Beth El.

To the Guardians of the Memorial Scrolls Trust Torah #164 by Rabbi Micah Hyman

Deuteronomy tells us the broken pieces of the first set of Commandments were stored in the Ark with the second set of Tablets written by Moses. We take this teaching to care for our Sacred objects no matter in what state of disrepair they may be, and preserve their legacy for the future. By preserving the broken with the fresh we bind an enduring chain of Jewish continuity.

Temple Beth El has fulfilled this duty. You are the guardians of MST Torah #164, one scroll from 1,564 scrolls that were rescued from Bohemia and Moravia. While Torah #164 is no longer "Kosher" (a Kosher scroll must have no blemishes and every letter must be both clear and legible), Beth El is part of an international consortium that preserves this patrimony.

The story of the Scrolls themselves is an adventure. When the Nazis (may their names be blotted) first controlled Prague and greater Czechoslovakia, the Jewish community in Prague began to curate Jewish objects from the region in a plan to create a Museum of the Jews. For the Nazis it was an emblem of their power to store the spoils of a past people they destroyed, like an Arch of Titus. For the Jews of Prague, it was a way to collect and catalog their patrimony in the hopes of returning the objects after the war. The Michle synagogue became the warehouse for these Scrolls and artifacts for a decade. In the early 1960's, the Communist Government of Czechoslovakia was cash starved and looking for revenue. An American Art dealer in England was approached to find a buyer. Through the Westminster Synagogue, and a donor Ralph Yablon, the entire collection was purchased and administered through the Czech Memorial Scrolls Trust. This trust distributed these scrolls around the world and one of them is in our own backyard.

MST #164 is on permanent loan. It was scribed around 1890 and was used in the community of Holesov. From external records we know the Holesov Synagogue was commemorated in 1893 (so this was a new scroll written for them) and was set on fire August 11th, 1942. We can assume the Torahs were evacuated at that time and soon stored with the others until after the war.

Your legacy at Beth El is deep and wide. Your Torah, both physical and spiritual, is strengthened by the old and the new side by side. The next time we gather safely and open the Sacred Ark, see the scrolls housed together. Even our darkest chapters are opportunities to bring the light of Torah to the world.

Zoom by telephone

We are conducting services on the internet with Zoom during the Pandemic. Here are the instructions for how to do it from a landline (that is, an ordinary) telephone.

- 1. First, you have to find out from whomever is setting up the Zoom meeting (the "host") what the code number (called the meeting ID) is for the particular meeting that you want to join. It will be an eleven digit number. Some of you may also be asked for the passcode which is TBE123.
- 2. Second, you have dial the following phone number: 1 669 990 6833
- 3. Third, you will hear a voice saying, "Welcome to Zoom. Enter your meeting ID followed by pound sign (#)"
- 4. That's all you have to do.
- 5. Sometimes the host of the meeting asks the invitees to mute themselves. There should be a mute button somewhere on the front of your telephone. Press it and then any unwanted background noises at your house (like barking dogs) will not be heard at the meeting.
- 6. When the meeting is over the host will end it and you can just hang
- 7. If you get a busy signal there are alternate phone numbers that you can use:
