Rabbi's Message - Dov Gottesfeld

Shalom to all:

Last week's Torah portion is called Mishpatim. It is the plural form of the Hebrew noun Mishpat (שפשט), which means law, justice; trial, case, suit; verdict, sentence, and judgment.

Among the Mishpatim we find the following: "And a stranger ("Ger") you shall not oppress; for you know the heart of a stranger, because you were strangers in the land of Egypt." (Exodus 23:9).

Reading about the difficulty the Israeli government has had in solving the dilemma regarding what to do about the African refugee seekers from Sudan and Eritrea, who illegally crossed into Israel, and the discriminating treatment that these refugees experienced from many Israelis, only confirms that the concept of "Mishpat" above is not being practiced today by many Israelis.

Similarly, there is another group of African people in Israel who are also experiencing similar discriminating treatments.

The difference is that they are Ethiopian Jews who were brought to Israel in a mass migration by the Israeli government in 1984, and in 1991.

Recently in Tel Aviv thousands of demonstrators came out to protest police violence against Israelis of Ethiopian descent. Several protesters clashed with police at the end of the event.*

One Ethiopian protester said: "Our goal is to have our voices heard, we don't want problems. There is an entire generation born here who doesn't know what Ethiopia is but we're labeled as Ethiopians because of our skin color. We see acts of violence towards Ethiopian Jews on a daily basis, but the murder of Yehuda by a policeman is the last straw. We just want to show that we will not stand for it anymore."

"It is not the first time that Israeli officials have been accused of racism against Ethiopians. Many activists have noted that one of the reasons the government has potentially not acted to bring the remaining Jews of Ethiopia to Israel is a combination of racism and finances."**

Unfortunately, that scenario sounds and looks too familiar to us, because it is right in our own backyard here in the U.S. As a "Forensic" Rabbi", (a title I conjured for myself), I decided to look deeply into the fundamentals of the human rejection of either of the Stranger (Ger), or the Jewish Ethiopians which were bought back to Israel.

Believing that the universe is structured much like the layers of an onion where each layer functions similarly - from the smallest particle to the largest mass, but in its own exclusive and unique way — I turned to look into our human physiological body. I wanted to understand why the human body often rejects organ transplants, and what has been done by the medical and scientific experts to stop that rejection. I trust that my findings will put me on the right track, which will lead me to "translate" them into ethical, moral, and compassionate elements which will suppress their rejection of those "unwelcomed human beings".

Transplant Rejection and Treatment in Bullet Points:

- A. "Transplant rejection is a process in which a transplant recipient's **immune system** attacks the transplanted organ or tissue to protect it from substances that may be harmful, such as germs, poisons, and sometimes, cancer cells.
- B. These harmful substances have proteins called **antigens**

coating their surfaces. As soon as these antigens enter the
body, the immune system recognizes that they are not from
that person's body and that they are "foreign" and attacks
them.

- C. Doctors use <u>medicines to suppress the recipient's immune system</u>. The goal is to prevent the immune system from attacking the newly transplanted organ when the organ is not closely matched. If these medicines are not used, the body will almost always launch an immune response and destroy the foreign tissue.
- **D** Symptoms: Taking those "miracle medicines" may cause various types of reactions positive ones, and negative ones. Stubborn ego may play a big role in that.
- **E** Treatment: A person should not give up, but increase his/her learning and experimenting in order to overcome his/her negative inclinations.
- **F** Outlook (prognosis): Keeping eyes on the goal require a life-long commitment of constant learning. The goal is quite simple: Be a part of the family of Man, and where you can't find a decent human being, you be the decent human being, and teach others to be likewise.

Like the body's natural inclination is to reject a foreign implant at first, with the help from medicine the body will often accept it. Likewise, men should not reject those different than themselves.

Movie Night

Our 73rd movie is entitled, "Isle of Dogs." It will be shown at the temple on Saturday, February 23rd, at 7:30 pm. A delightful movie about what in serious life is most troubling in today's world: Deportation of some denizens from the community to exile and likely genocide. This movie, which I believe can be taken as a metaphor, takes place in the future. And - as the title suggests - the exiles consist of all the human community's dogs, from household pets to strays. The ostensible reason for this exile is some kind of unknown disease that was spreading among the dogs. The human and canine communities are depicted differently; the dogs speak perfect English and have wonderful personalities while the humans speak in some other language that we can't quite understand. Adult viewers love the dogs. One reviewer wrote that this movie " is immensely touching and fun. Yet beneath the film's whimsical surface it is not hard to detect some serious points being made about fear mongering and scapegoating that are all too timely." Another reviewer wrote, "You will thrill to the extraordinary stop-motion animation which not only makes sure each strand of fur seems tactile but lets you see the soul behind its canine characters' eyes. You may shudder at the way the movie portrays a futuristic dystopia in which, thanks to a "snout fever" epidemic, all dogs living in a fictional Japanese metropolis are banished to a broken-down quarantine area known as 'Trash Island.' And you'll chuckle at how well chosen the celebrity voices are."

The movie is 101 minutes long. Recommended donation is \$5. There will be refreshments.

TBE Safety and Security
