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Rabbi's Message - Dov Gottesfeld

RE.....!? DEDICATION Shalom to all:

The word "Chanukah" does not appear in the entire Hebrew Bible as a holiday. However the three Hebrew letters of the root Ch' N' Kh' (כ'נ'ה, from which the noun "Chanukah" is derived, appears only 16 times in the Hebrew Bible. Mostly in connection with the dedication of the altar in the Tabernacle in the Sinai desert. It appears 6 times in the book of numbers, twice in Deuteronomy in relation to the dedication of a house which people are moving into, once in Kings 1 during the dedication of the House of God (The first Temple), once in the book of Psalms, during a dedication of God's house during King David's kingdom, twice in the book of Daniel, when King Nebuchadnezzar dedicated an image which was set up in Jerusalem, twice in the book of Ezra- when the people of Israel returned from exile in Babylonia and celebrated the dedication of the house of God with joy, and twice in the book of Nehemiah when the Jews

celebrated the dedication of the completion of the restoration of the wall of Jerusalem, which had been destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar, and twice in Chronicles II - first during the dedication of the House of God in Jerusalem, and later during the dedication of the altar at the house of God.

How interesting! An exclusive word was created for a single holy purpose and to indicate a person's commitment to a higher task or purpose. In this case, it is the Dedication of the newly restored Temple in Jerusalem, which had been defiled by Antiochus, and eventually led to the Maccabean revolt of 167 BCE.

As we very well know that the revolt was not for the purpose of gaining any territory or other tangible objects, but primarily for the right to worship their religion freely as Jews.

Growing up in Israel and celebrating Chanukah as a youngster, I recall my teachers telling us that

in our current times when celebrating Chanukah we, Jews, rededicate the temple in Jerusalem "anew" (Me'chadash – in Hebrew).

I always understood the meaning of "Me'chadash" (anew) as "again" — as it is often used in a daily conversation. That is until I learned about the English definition of the prefix "Re..." as in "Rededication," which most articles in English about Chanukah refer to the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem.

And it caught my attention.

"Re- is added to verbs and nouns to form new verbs and nouns which describe a change in the position or state of something. For example, to 'relocate' something means to locate it in a different place and to 'rearrange' something means to arrange it in a different way.

Rededication - a new dedication; "the rededication of the Temple of Jerusalem." Dedication - a ceremony in which something (as a building) is dedicated to some goal or purpose."

In other words, I concluded, that by "rededicating", we should not return to 167B.C.E., and pretend to be the Maccabees, and focus our attention on rededicating the old Temple in Jerusalem (as we were commanded to do during the Passover Seder when 'Each person is obligated to see himself/herself as if he/she came out of Egypt'), but we should focus on how to work together —world wide - to find solutions to combat today's enemy, anti-Semitism.

Chag Chanukah Same'ach – Happy Chanukah.

Hanukkah starts on Thursday, December 10th, and concludes on Thursday, December 17th. We will celebrate this year with a Virtual Hanukkah party on Thursday evening, December 17th, at 7:00 pm on Zoom. As in the past, tickets will be mailed to you for the raffle. Pictures of some of the prizes appear in this December Bulletin. An additional prize will be \$300 of scrip. As for food: Rabbi Gottesfeld has a recipe he's sharing with us also in this Bulletin on pages 5-7 (HANUKKAH LATKESWITH VEGGIES – for a change!). Anita will light the candles and say both blessings. Diane will lead us in song. (The songs will be provided by email.) Marsha will pick the winning tickets for the raffle in front of the computer's camera so you can all see it on Zoom. If you can donate prizes that would be great.

On Tuesday, December 15th, a delegation from TBE will light the Hanukkiah in the SLO Mission Plaza at 5:00 pm.

The vaccines for the COVID-19 disease are about to be certified and our frontline health workers will be the first to get it. We owe these vaccines to the scientists who created a new type of vaccine which utilizes messenger RNA, something unknown at the time of the Spanish Flu Pandemic of 1918. It's been estimated that the deaths in the Spanish Flu Pandemic in the U.S. numbered around 675,000 people. That was when the U.S. population was about 103 million. Today our population is around 331 million. It appears that the state governments will be setting the priorities for the various categories of people as to when they will be getting the vaccinations. There are people providing essential tasks which involve greater exposure to the virus, older people who are in susceptible circumstances along with their nursing home caregivers, older people who are relatively healthy, younger adult age groups, and finally young people. It seems that each individual will require two vaccinations which are to be spaced three weeks apart. Hopefully, the vaccinations will be free. There is a concern that a large number of people will resist getting vaccinated possibly because of fear or by asserting their rights not to be vaccinated, not to wear masks, and not to practice social distancing.

Most of us will be asked to stay at home as much as possible throughout the Winter months and if we need to get out to purchase food and medical services to wear face masks and practice social distancing. As I write this column in the first week of December, both Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties have issued "Stay-at-Home Orders" effective Sunday, December 6th, and likely to last for three weeks. See page 4 to see what that entails.

For some of you these restrictions might seem more of the same old, same old, since last March. A lot of us are getting bored hanging around the house with little or nothing to do. If you're in the mood for something different, I've spent some time compiling four lists of various entertaining and educational videos that I found on the internet. I've emailed three of these lists to temple members on November 26th and a fourth list on November 30th. This 4th list appears in this Bulletin on page 8. Today (December 5th) I just sent you a fifth list of jokes that I have been collecting over the years. If you haven't seen any of these emails you might find them in your "junk email" file. Please feel free to ask me to resend them to you by email. They all have themes that are connected with the Jewish People.

I hope we all take the necessary precautions and get through this dark period safely.

The Regional Stay Home Order would be in effect for 3 weeks after the trigger and instructs Californians to stay at home as much as possible to limit the mixing with other households that can lead to COVID-19 spread. It allows access to (and travel for) critical services and allows outdoor activities to preserve Californians' physical and mental health. This limited closure will help stop the surge and prevent overwhelming regional ICU capacity.

In any region that triggers a Regional Stay Home Order because it drops below 15% ICU capacity, the following sectors must close:

- Indoor and outdoor playgrounds
- Indoor recreational facilities
- Hair salons and barbershops
- Personal care services
- Museums, zoos, and aquariums
- Movie theaters
- Wineries
- Bars, breweries, and distilleries
- Family entertainment centers
- Cardrooms and satellite wagering
- Limited services
- Live audience sports
- Amusement parks

The following sectors will have additional modifications in addition to 100% masking and physical distancing:

- Outdoor recreational facilities: Allow outdoor operation only without any food, drink or alcohol sales. Additionally, overnight stays at campgrounds will not be permitted.
- Retail: Allow indoor operation at 20% capacity with entrance metering and no eating or drinking in the stores. Additionally, special hours should be instituted for seniors and others with chronic conditions or compromised immune systems.
- Shopping centers: Allow indoor operation at 20% capacity with entrance metering and no eating or drinking in the stores. Additionally, special hours should be instituted for seniors and others with chronic conditions or compromised immune systems.
- Hotels and lodging: Allow to open for critical infrastructure support only.
- Restaurants: Allow only for take-out, pick-up, or delivery.
- Offices: Allow remote only except for critical infrastructure sectors where remote working is not possible.
- Places of worship and political expression: Allow outdoor services only.
- Entertainment production including professional sports: Allow operation without live audiences.
 Additionally, testing protocol and "bubbles" are highly encouraged.

The following sectors are allowed to remain open when a remote option is not possible with appropriate infectious disease preventative measures including 100% masking and physical distancing:

• Critical infrastructure • Schools Non-urgent medical and dental care

Zoom by telephone

We are conducting services on the internet with Zoom during the Pandemic. Here are the instructions for how to do it from a landline (that is, an ordinary) telephone.

- First, you have to find out from whomever is setting up the Zoom meeting (the "host") what the code number (called the meeting ID) is for the particular meeting that you want to join. It will be an eleven digit number. Some of you may also be asked for the passcode which for us is TBE123.
- 2. Second, you have to dial the following phone number: 1 669 990 6833
- 3. Third, you will hear a voice saying, "Welcome to Zoom. Enter your meeting ID followed by pound sign (#)"
- 4. That's all you have to do.
- 5. Sometimes the host of the meeting asks the invitees to mute themselves. There should be a mute button somewhere on the front of your telephone. Press it and then any unwanted background noises at your house (like barking dogs) will not be heard at the meeting.
- 6. When the meeting is over the host will end it and you can just hang up.
- 7. If you get a busy signal there are these alternate phone numbers that you can use:

HANUKKAH LATKESWITH VEGGIES - for a change By Rabbi Dov Gottesfeld

INGREDIENTS & Instructions
Onion
Eggs
Potatoes
mission
Gluten Bread crumbs I bake tortillas & make them into crumbs
Prepare a cheese cloth
Grate the potatoes
Chop a couple of onions - small
Put a ball of the grated potatoes into the cheese cloth
Squeeze the liquid out of it by twisting it





Mix the eggs with the potatoes, crumbs & onions.....



Add parsley

Mix together with your favorite spices....

(I use garlic, mixed herbs, and roast vegetables spice blend [comes in a jar])

Now is the moment of your creativity!

On different occasions I add:

Spinach, or any type of frozen vegetables, or fresh grilled vegetables [see pictures] (they were taken in different times).



Grilled cauliflower with garlic & onion powder



Grilled yellow
Zuchinni/
Brussel sprouts/
Japanese eggplant

I chop them with a knife into small pieces and add them to the latke mix, Make sure that the mix is on the "dry" side (not wet with liquid.

I use very little Canola oil to fry the latkes on medium heat. Never on high, and

I cover them while they're in the skillet 3-4 minutes). turning

After

them over, I cover the skillet again, and when thy're crispy on the bottom, 2-3 minutes, I remove the cover and turn the latkes, agin for a short time, to make the top crispy, again, for a minute or so - uncovered. (they became soft from the steam inside.)


